ANNEXURE - III

BEST PRACTICES

(i) Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is a system in which the students have a choice to choose from the prescribed courses, which are referred as core, elective or minor or soft skill courses and they can learn at their own pace and the entire assessment is graded-based on a credit system. The basic idea is to look into the needs of the students so as to keep up-to-date with development of higher education in India and abroad. CBCS aims to redefine the curriculum keeping pace with the liberalisation and globalisation in education. CBCS allows students an easy mode of mobility to various educational institutions spread across the world along with the facility of transfer of credits earned by students.

(ii) Outcome Based Education

Teaching and Learning Process – The desired outcome is selected first and the curriculum, instructional materials and assessments are created to support the intended outcome.

Curriculum and Planning – The learning outcomes are set out sequentially on a gradation of increasing complexity that students are expected to master.

Assessment Tools – OBE focuses on how much and how well the students have learnt **Implementing OBE**

There are five *prongs* involved in implementing OBE

- 1. Vision and Mission of the Institution
- 2. Vision and Mission of the department
- 3. Listing and achieving Programme Educational Objectives (PEOs).
- 4. Listing and achieving Programme Outcomes (Pos)
- 5. Listing and achieving Course Outcomes (Cos)

(iii) Online Course using Moodles Software:

Moodle is a learning platform designed to provide educators, administrators and learners with a single robust, secure and integrated system to create personalised learning environments.

(iv) Computerised Question paper Generating System:

Traditional method of test paper generation is time-consuming. In order to avoid this, the college has introduced a computerized question paper generating system wherein the end semester Autonomous Question papers are generated through software from question bank.

(v) One Credit course:

The students are offered one credit courses for additional learning in the contemporary areas and to meet the industry requirements.
